Words from Fr Brendan Clover

Dear friends,

Sunday's Gospel is the famous parable of the Sower. It is the only parable which is explained. This is more than a little odd. Jesus never explained his teaching. He taught to provoke and challenge and stimulate, 'he who has ears let him hear!'

This may mean that the explanation of the parable of the Sower provided by Matthew (unless Fr Robert tells us differently) is unlikely to have come from the lips of Jesus. In the context of the persecution of the first Christians the explanation of the story makes sense as the weak fall away, and the cares of the world and the flesh and the devil begin their compromising work. But I don't think the explanation would not have made sense to Our Lord. The parable of the Sower is one of a group of parables called 'contrast parables'. The point of these parables is contained in the contrasting times described in them.

The context is the harvest. The harvest is a metaphor used to describe the breaking through of the kingdom of heaven.

<u>The beginning time</u> is the frustration and hardship to which the Sower's labour is liable. <u>The end time</u> sees the dreary fallow land producing a field of waving corn, with a yield that surpasses all prayer and understanding.

The point... to us the labour, the sheer effort of believing and witnessing, may seem futile and fruitless and as things go wrong, we are tempted to cynicism. But Jesus is full of faith and confidence. God has made a beginning, bringing with it a harvest of reward. Despite failure and opposition, from hopeless beginnings God brings forth a harvest, a triumphant end, for God is always active, and all depends on his activity alone.

The assurance that God's hour approaches is an essential and radical element in the teaching of Jesus. We are judged in every moment and in every situation. Jesus speaks in parables to elicit from his hearers a decision about their own lives. Today is the hour, God's hour is coming, indeed it has already begun. So, with a renewed sense of urgency, this comes with the assurance of my love and prayers and my encouragement,




St. John's Summer Fete!! This Saturday July 15th 2.00-4.00pm


