### **Words from Fr Brendan Clover**

Dear friends,

All the deprivations and extra duties that we may take on during Lent (and you can read about them elsewhere in this Newsletter) are not only a reminder of our sinful humanity and our need to do something about our sins, shortcomings and faults, but they teach us the stark reality that resurrection entails the cross. Put simply, "no cross, no crown." Those crosses will assail us in many forms – perhaps through sickness, financial worries, a failed marriage, loss of a job, the death of a loved one, being slandered, having to cope with a wayward child, etc.. St. John of the Cross, a Discalced Carmelite and Doctor of the Church, who endured many crosses during his life, identified himself with Christ Crucified, and spoke about the 'dark night of the soul'. Cou; d it be that the crosses we endure are an invitation to participate in the Passion of Christ? I think so.

Crosses in our lives serve as a reminder that only by bearing them can we really be linked to Christ, who had to endure Good Friday before His Resurrection. Let us remember, though, that our crosses, if borne heroically, eventually lead to peace, joy and salvation in a new life. That new life must be prepared for, and we are reminded of this by observing the activity that takes place on Holy Saturday prior to the Easter Vigil. Churches are cleaned, Easter flowers are brought in, altar linens are changed, altar servers are practicing, etc. What is the deeper meaning?

Even when the Paschal season ends, the faithful should be in constant preparation for their personal day of transition when their earthly life is over. St. Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 2:9 that "Eye

has not seen, ear has not heard, nor has it entered into the heart of man, the things which God has prepared for those who love Him."

We are charged "to love Him," to make this a reality for ourselves, if we hope to experience the joys of resurrection after our pilgrimage of life.

So I invite you to keep a holy and happy Lent. We are in this life together to bear one anothers' burdens, and to prepare for our eternal destiny, heaven and life with God.

### A BETTER WAY


Culture, it's said, is 'how things get done around here'. This suggests that our understanding of the world is largely formed by our experiences and what we're accustomed to. That's all fine until everything around us, as it does, keeps on changing. Then we're then set on a collision course between how we think things should be, and how they actually are. Anybody aged over 40 who's had to ask a nine-year-old how to use their new phone will understand this dilemma perfectly.

Cultural collisions aren't just restricted to technology. They affect churches too. Many of us grew up with a model of church set up by the Victorians. This mostly meant that each parish had one church building with its own vicar, who took responsibility for most aspects of the ministry needed in a particular place. Yet even this was new in its day. Look much further back and things worked very differently. The New Testament speaks of churches where lots of different people played many different roles, each operating out of the particular skills and gifts given them by God. In Ephesians the writer describes a church where 'some [are] apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers'.

So, what would be the right model of church for our day? The Victorians' assumption that the vicar would do almost everything would seem to be a crying waste of the gifts and passions that together we share. And as more of our clergy care for three, six or more parishes, the nineteenth century model is increasingly leaving our vicars tired, overstretched and liable to burn out.

We need a better way; one that draws on the rich talents, abilities and skills that our church members have. Here in Bath and Wells we're calling this 'shared local ministry'. Examples of what that can look like exist in many places around our diocese. Neither first century nor nineteenth century, but an emerging twenty first century way of how we want 'to get things done around here'. A better way to inhabit well the faith we've inherited in our time and generation.

### Do you have talents and experience to share?

After many years of loyal and dedicated service to this parish and the PCC, with much sadness we are saying farewell to our PCC Secretary, Sue and our Treasurer, Fiona at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in April. Sue and Fiona have done a fabulous job at keeping the PCC on track procedurally and financially. We thank them so much for all they have done for St John's Church.

We are now in search of replacements for Sue and Fiona, who are difficult acts to follow. However, both these roles are supported by the diocese who run an induction programme, regular updates, access to the diocese Finance Department and the Diocesan Secretary's office, plus buddies in similar roles in other parishes, and the support of the Churchwardens, PCC Chair and relevant sub-committees at St John's.

We hope the following provides a brief insight into the roles we are looking to fill:

### **PCC Secretary**

The primary responsibilities of a PCC Secretary are to support the PCC Chair in the preparation and organisation of meetings and to handle all correspondence on behalf of the PCC. The Diocesan Office contacts the parish from time to time to request specific information, every effort is made to keep this to a minimum and all meeting agendas are issued and minutes stored electronically using Microsoft Office.

#### **PCC Treasurer**

You do not need to have been a treasurer of an organisation before. In many respects it is not to dissimilar from keeping good control of household finances, however, if you have an understanding of some accountancy practice it will be useful but not essential. This role implements decisions made the PCC. This role is also supported with dioceses induction training for new treasurers, updates and continued support throughout the financial year for all financial procedures and processes .

For further information about both roles please speak with Nicola or Gary, Churchwardens.
