Words from Fr Brendan Clover

Dear friends,

This Sunday is *'laetare'* Sunday, or Mothering Sunday, and we shall celebrate it with a gathering after Mass and at the Mass itself.

Here are some of the traditions that have shaped Mothering Sunday into the celebration recognised today:

The Journey to the Mother Church

In the 16th century, Mothering Sunday was less about mothers and more about church. Back then, people would make a journey to their 'mother' church once a year. This might have been their home church, their nearest cathedral or a major parish church in a bigger town. The service which took place at the 'mother' church symbolized the coming together of families. This would have represented a significant journey for many.

A day off to visit Mother

Another tradition was to allow those working in the fields on wealthy farms and estates in England to have the day off on the fourth Sunday of Lent to visit their mothers and possibly go to church too. This was a variation on the theme of visiting the 'mother' church and was a move towards a more family focused occasion. Before the days of cars and roads, family get-togethers were far rarer, (and facetime was still a long way off). In some ways this tradition is still alive today as grown-up children often visit their parents on mothering Sunday.

Simnel Cake

Simnel cake has a strong affiliation to Mothering Sunday as it is usually associated with spring and Easter. It resembles a Christmas fruit cake but should be slightly lighter in texture. The other difference is the two layers of marzipan. Simnel cake should have a layer of marzipan running through the middle like a Victoria sponge and then another layer of marzipan on the top. Traditionally, you should also roll some marzipan into eleven eggs and place these on the top. The eggs are supposed to symbolize the disciples who followed Jesus – note that Judas is excluded.

Traditions today

This Sunday, churches around the country will be sharing their own traditions, celebrating and giving thanks to the huge impact mothers have on each of our lives. The main service on Mothering Sunday in churches across the country is central to the life of the church. The church recognizes that the day may be difficult for some people and so it is common place for services to include prayers for those who don't find the day particularly easy. Families across the country will be preparing little presents and cards and, in some churches as in ours, flowers are blessed and handed out during the main service. Families come together to have lunch, or children make breakfast in bed for their mothers, leaving all the mess to be cleared up later! It's all about showing appreciation and many make a huge effort to make their mother feel special.

So, give thanks for your membership of Mother Church, for your own mother, departed or alive, and better still, come to church and celebrate the feast,

RECOMMENDED LENT READING

Entering the Twofold Mystery by Eric Varden

Erik Varden became Bishop of Trondheim in his native Norway on 2019. This, his second book, is a meditation on the religious life, on the life of Christ, and the call to live in community. The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book this year is

Embracing Justice by Isabelle Hamley. Isabelle is the Archbishop's former chaplain, now theological adviser to the House of Bishops. Her knowledge as an Old Testament scholar shines forth in the first three chapters on Genesis, Exodus and liberation. The remaining chapters deal with the Incarnation, the Crucifixion and Holy Communion.

in **The Way of the Franciscans - A Prayer Journey through Lent** Daniel Horan offers insights from Franciscans across the ages. There are questions for reflection or discussion.

Richard Harries, former Bishop of Oxford, offers us **Hearing God in poetry** - **Fifty poems for Lent and Easter.** Each chapter is a poem and a short reflection on the poet, poem and some gentle theology. Henry Martin is a retired prison chaplain retired to France where he devotes his time to writing, painting, his husband and their dog. **Vincent van Gogh and the Good Samaritan** recalls Henri Nouwen's classic on the prodigal son.

Electoral Roll

The revision of this year's Electoral Roll will end on Sunday 3rd April when the new Roll will be published.

Apart from it being necessary to be on the Roll of the Parish in order to vote at the APCM, it is an opportunity to demonstrate in a tangible way commitment to the Parish and its mission. To be entered onto the Roll you must be Baptised and over the age of 16. You do not have to reside in the Parish if you have attended worship at the Parish Church habitually over the past 6 months (I fall into this category) or have been prevented from doing so due to illness, work commitments etc. You may also be on the Electoral Roll of more than one Parish but can only serve as a Church Officer (Warden, Treasurer, PCC member etc.) in one. I will explain on Sunday morning, if you can wait that long, how you can apply to be entered onto the Roll and will also display a name only roll at the back of the Church to see if you are already on it. If you are, you need do nothing for another couple of years when the Roll will then be created again.
