Words from Fr Brendan Clover

Dear friends,

First let me wish you a very happy Christmas with those you love, family and friends. Thank you to everyone who has sent cards and gifts, all very much appreciated.

And thank you to everyone who has taken part in our faithful keeping of Advent. There have been some memorable occasions amidst the daily round of prayer and Eucharist.

Tomorrow is Christmas Eve, and we have Holy Hour 10-11am, our 'pop-up' Nativity Service and Midnight Mass at 11pm.

Mass on Christmas Day is at our usual 10.30am. And then, in quick succession, some beautiful feast days: St Stephen, St John the Evangelist, the Holy Innocents, and S Thomas Becket before the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God on New Year's Day. There is Mass every day next week, and the holiday - a word which abbreviates holy day - provides a chance to attend to the things of God whilst keeping the Feast.

Saint John, our beloved patron, in his gospel went to the heart of the matter: "He came to his own and his own received him not". This refers first and foremost to Bethlehem: the Son of David comes to his own city but has to be born in a stable because there is no room for him at the inn. Then it refers to Israel: the one who is sent comes to his own people, but they do not want him. And truly it refers to all mankind: he through whom the world was made, the primordial Creator-Word enters into the world, but he is not listened to, he is not received. And these words refer also to us, to each individual and to society as a whole. Do we have time and space for God? Can he enter into our lives? Does he find room in us, or have we occupied all the available space in our thoughts, our actions, our lives for ourselves? That's the challenge of the Gospel.
